Although the public cannot be present the names of those who died will be read out and a candle placed on the altar in their memory.

The season of Advent begins on Sunday, 29 November.

Advent and Christmas are going to be very different. This does not mean that we don't celebrate the birth of Jesus, just that we may have to do it very differently.

Rather than complain about what we cannot do at present, why not concentrate on all that is possible.

We can use the restrictions we are living under to bring the focus of Advent and Christmas back where it rightly belongs, on the birth of Jesus Christ, Emmanuel, God with us.

This year why not make a special effort to celebrate Advent at home. At present we are all waiting for the end of the pandemic, waiting for the "r" number to reduce significantly, waiting for a safe and successful vaccine, waiting to resume contact and relationships with family and friends. Waiting has always been the theme of Advent. Waiting for, and anticipating, and preparing for the birth of Jesus, has always been the purpose of Advent.

The Advent Wreath has become a powerful reminder and symbol of our need to prepare, and of the shortness of time to do so.

Next week we will publish in the newsletter an Advent prayer service for the home. It can be used in your own household when lighting the candles on the Advent Wreath, during the coming weeks leading up to Christmas.

This Sunday, 22 November, immediately after the 11.30 a.m. Mass, Sandra McCluskey will give a demonstration on how to make a simple Advent Wreath for the home. This demonstration can be viewed on the Louisburgh church webcam and it will also be made available on our facebook page. Whether or not restrictions are lifted, whether or not churches are open, if only tiny numbers of people can attend Advent or Christmas Mass or services, we need to remember that Christmas is all about God coming among us and being with us, wherever we are, whatever we are doing, whoever we are with; Emmanuel, God is with us!

Blessing of Advent Wreath:

A short service of prayer, song and blessing of the Advent wreath will take place next Saturday, 28 November, at 5.30 p.m. in Louisburgh church. You may follow the service on the Louisburgh church webcam.

Because of the corona virus is not possible to leave lists of the dead in the church, as would be traditional.

However, a suggestion: write out your list at home and place it in a prominent place, create a little altar with a crucifix if necessary. Light a candle and say the prayers for the dead together as a family.

If you follow the Mass online on the parish webcam, or on radio, you could again light a candle beside the list during the Mass. May all our dead rest in peace.

- For this family, that we may never forget those who have died and that through prayer we may remain united with them. Lord hear us.

- For those we remember today in prayer that we may be re-united with them in the peace of the kingdom. Lord hear us.
- For those who mourn, that they be uplifted by the love of friends and family and the power of prayer. Lord hear us.
- Father in heaven listen to the prayers of your family which we offer in the Spirit, through Christ, Our Lord, Amen.
- Our Father.... Hail Mary.... Glory be to the Father... **Closing Prayer**
- May the Lord support us all the day long 'til the shadows lengthen and the evening comes and the busy world is hushed and the fever of life is done.
- Then in his mercy may He grant us a safe lodging, a holy rest and peace at the last. Amen.
