Ash Wednesday

International day of fasting & prayer for peace.

Pope Francis said the threat of war in Ukraine had caused "great pain in my heart", and urged all politicians to make a serious examination of conscience before God about their actions. Francis urged leaders to abstain from any moves that would cause further suffering for people.

He proclaimed Ash Wednesday - 02 March - an international day of fasting and prayer for peace. Ashes will be blessed and distributed at the three Masses in the parish on Ash Wednesday

Holy Communion for those with Coeliac disease If with coeliac disease wish to receive Holy those Communion under the form of wine, they should inform the priest, or ask one of the stewards to do so, <u>before</u> Mass.

Prevention of COVID 19;

While restrictions have been lifted the virus is still being transmitted in community and we must all do what we can to prevent those who are vulnerable getting infected and potentially becoming very ill.

- Everyone attending Mass or services in church is urged to wear a mask covering nose & mouth at all times. Please use the hand sanitisers on entry to the church.
- We will not, as of yet, resume the use of the holy water fonts and will still omit the sign of peace at Mass, as well as the reception of Holy Communion under both species. Holy Communion will still only be given into the hand.
- You are asked to use your own common sense when picking a seat in church and avoid crowding together as much as possible. Use all the space that is available.
- Anybody with any covid, flu-like, or cold-like symptoms, cough, sneezing, runny nose, sore throat, temperature, lack of smell etc. should not attend church but phone their G.P. for advice.
- Ventilation of Churches: In order to reduce the risk of spreading the corona virus, an airborne virus, the churches are ventilated as best we can when congregations are present.


Killeen Community Council:

Thandekile was just 31 when Covid-19 claimed the life of her beloved husband, Donovan, last year. In Zimbabwe, where the cruel effects of poverty, the pandemic and climate change have left people on the brink of catastrophe, Thandekile must face her grief all alone.

The impacts of climate change meant that life was already a struggle for Thandekile and her family, bringing drought and unpredictable rainfall. Covid-19 disrupted the family's life even further, as markets and schools were closed. Thandekile is working hard to provide for her children and with the support of Trócaire's local partner organisations, she hopes that her efforts will be enough to build a better tomorrow for her family.

She strives to be self-sufficient and she hopes to start up a clothes shop business, to make a better life for herself and her family.

It is not just that she must overcome so many obstacles to provide for her family. However, Thandekile's faith is important to her and she says that the Lord's Prayer gives her courage, hope and strength.

She sees that courage, hope and strength in the help she receives from people like you and the local partner organisations that work with Trócaire.

These values of courage, hope and strength are exactly why the bishops of Ireland founded Trócaire, and almost 50 years later these values have never been more relevant.

The Covid-19 crisis has shown us how small our world actually is, and we pray for all those affected by the virus in Ireland, Zimbabwe and around the world.
