Killeen Choir practice takes place on Wednesday evenings at 6.30 p.m. New members are welcome.



Covid / Transmissible Viruses

"How a society treats its most vulnerable is always the measure of its humanity."

We could adapt this quote and say

"How a church treats its most vulnerable is always the measure of its Christianity."

For the present we will continue to make facemasks available at the doors of our churches for all who wish to wear them: many do so because of an underlying medical condition or because of a compromised immune system, or out of care and respect for those in our community who may have such conditions.

Hand Sanitiser is available at the entrances to the churches and all are requested to use it.

Although the incidence of covid is greatly reduced it still remains a serious threat to those who are vulnerable. As of Saturday 18/03/2023 there are 227 people in hospital with covid in the state. In the week ending 14 March there were 11 deaths related to covid.

For the moment all are requested to continue to receive Holy Communion in the hand and so avoid any possible risk of salvia, and possibly a virus, being passed on to another person on the fingers of the Eucharistic Minister.

Our Eucharistic Ministers have been sanitising their hands before and after distributing Holy Communion for many years and will continue with this practice.

Climate Action Louisburgh Locality (CALL)

honoured to receive the Cathaoirleach's Green Community of the Year Award. The first 11 houses/public buildings on our PV Meitheal have now been completed. 230 solar panels have been installed. A total of approximately 90 kiloWatts of electrical power generation is now available for free local production, thereby reducing our dependence on very expensive outside sources.

Our local contractors have been working skilfully and cost effectively and are ready to begin our next stage. A number of projects have already been identified but we are still taking names for this (Spring) Meitheal.

Social justice

'Social justice is about making society function better – providing the support and tools to help turn lives around.'

Climate justice

In recent years, Trócaire has focused on 'climate injustice' and working for 'climate justice', because climate change is more than an environmental issue, it is a justice issue.

Climate injustice refers to the fact that those who are being hit worst by climate change are the most vulnerable women, men and children in our world who have done the least to cause it.

Trócaire works with people in Africa, Asia and Latin America to support communities to adapt to changing climatic conditions.

In Ireland, we work locally to raise awareness in the minds of Irish citizens of the daily struggle to survive faced by these communities.

Achieving climate justice will not happen until wealthier nations recognise the injustice facing poorer nations.
